1. Fixing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is an easy fix, but a loose hinge needs a bit more attention.

1. **Find the concern:** Open and close the door gradually to determine the bothersome hinge.

1. **Check the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the leading and middle hinges.
2. **Use the longer screw technique:** If tightening up does not work, replace one brief screw on the frame side of the top hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the whole door assembly back into positioning.
3. **Plane the edge:** If the door still sticks after changing the hinges, use a block aircraft or a sander to shave down a small portion of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.
