2. Operation Bravo Case

Thought about by many to be the supreme collector's item, the Operation Bravo Case was released in September 2013. It features iconic skins like the *AK-47|Fire Serpent* and the *AWP|Graphite*. Because it required an Operation Bravo pass to drop frequently throughout its time, the flowing supply is extremely low.

3. CS: GO Weapon Case (Series 1, 2, and 3)

These are the grandfathers of all weapon cases. Launched soon after the video game's launch in late 2013 and early 2014, these cases introduced the original weapon finishes. Opening one of these today is considered a high-stakes gamble, as a single case can cost numerous dollars simply to acquire.
