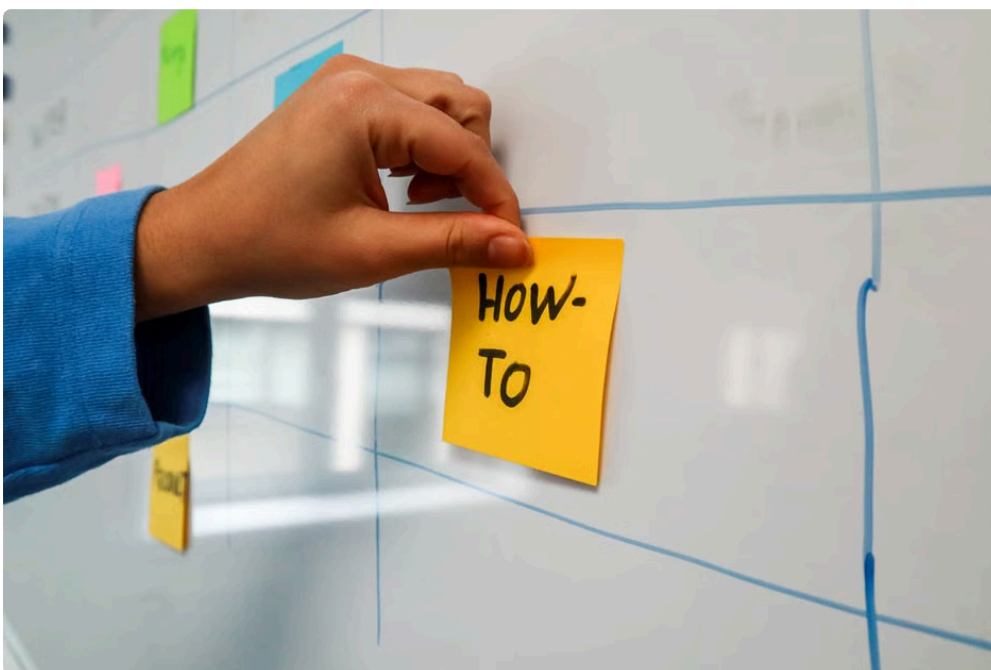
When brought onto mobile devices or browser-based games, developers face a tradeoff:

Marked Numbers Feedback: The Heart of Progress Indicators

Here are key elements developers commonly use to show progress clearly:



- **Visual highlighting:** Matching numbers often get a colored overlay or a glow effect, providing instant recognition.

- **Subtle animations:** A soft pop or checkmark appearing on matched numbers draws attention without distracting from gameplay.

Mr Q and Auto-Marking Simplicity

At Mr Q, the bingo experience is streamlined for browser-based play. When the caller announces a number, the matching squares on the digital card instantly switch color shades from a muted grey-blue to a bright aqua. The user doesn't have to lift a finger. This minimal tutorial UI approach makes new players feel comfortable immediately because the app's feedback does the explaining.

For progress, a slim line progress bar sits quietly beneath the card grid showing the percentage of the pattern complete, with small numeric indicators marking called numbers. There's no overwhelming text or step-by-step tutorial; the visual flow does the guiding instead.

Hybrid Design: Bingo Grid Meets Slot Reels

A recent trend complicates things but also offers inventive solutions: hybrid designs that mix the bingo grid with slot machine reels. This can confuse users if not presented well, a criticism sometimes noted by The Sarnia Journal's coverage of Ontario-based gaming apps.

In these hybrids, a slot reel spins to select numbers rather than a random draw call. This adds animation flair but risks hiding the win conditions behind multiple layers of interface.

Good hybrid designs incorporate progress indicators in both sections:

- **On the reels:** Numbers currently spinning are highlighted with a glowing border, and when they stop, the matching number on the bingo grid flashes in sync.

- **On the grid:** A patterned outline grows along rows or diagonals when partial completion is achieved, familiarizing users with the objective through visual cues.
- **Progress bar:** Separately, a progress bar or star meter illustrates how close the player is to winning, updating smoothly after each spin.

This dual feedback ensures players stay oriented without needing lengthy textual guides.

Minimal Tutorial UI: Less Is More

It’s tempting for developers to create multi-page instructions or pop-ups explaining every rule or button. But the best bingo apps minimize tutorial UI and instead depend on intuitive visual language.

Some principles to keep tutorial UI minimal yet effective include:

1. **Intuitive iconography:** Use familiar symbols like checkmarks on marked numbers or a “bingo” banner that appears once a pattern completes.
2. **Contextual hints:** Instead of static instructions, offer small tooltips or highlights only when the user first encounters a new element.
3. **Layered complexity:** Start with classic bingo rules in early rounds, then gradually introduce hybrid features or timed rounds with optional short hints.

Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation’s digital lotto initiatives often deploy these strategies, favoring immersive play over interruption-heavy tutorials.

Where Progress Indicators Sit on Screen Matters

Finally, an important UX detail often overlooked is where progress indicators appear relative to the card area:

- **Bottom-aligned progress bars:** Visible but unobtrusive, conveniently located for right-thumb reach on mobile devices.
- **Corner badges:** Small numeric counts of called and matched numbers placed on card corners provide glanceable info.
- **Center-of-card animations:** Brief burst effects celebrate milestones without covering important number areas.

These thoughtful placements prevent progress indicators from blocking bingo grid visibility or cluttering the interface.
