Coinflip	A simple 1v1 video game where 2 gamers wager comparable skin worths. One is designated heads, the other tails, and a digital coin determines the winner.	Low (Platform takes a small commission, around 3%-- 5%)

How CS2 Skin Deposits and Withdrawals Work
