- **Trade Hold Updates:** To curb immediate trading and money laundering, Valve presented a mandatory 7-day trade hold on any traded skin. While this temporarily interrupted the gambling market, operators quickly adjusted utilizing P2P systems and crypto cash-outs.
- **Legal Scrutiny:** Governments worldwide have begun taking notice. Class-action claims, federal government examinations, and statutory bans in numerous countries have required operators to continuously shift domains and legal structures.
