How Transactions Work: Skins vs. Crypto

- **Steam Account Security:** Logging into third-party sites by means of the Steam OpenID protocol needs vigilance. Phishing sites regularly simulate popular gambling platforms to take API secrets and pirate user stocks.
 - *Tip:* Never enter your Steam credentials on a site you have not completely vetted, and constantly use Steam Guard Mobile Authenticator.
