The Steam Workshop Pipeline

1. **Development:** Community artists style skins using 3D modeling software and upload them to the Steam Workshop.
2. **Community Voting:** Players vote on their favorite designs, pushing popular items to the attention of designers.
3. **Choice:** Facepunch curates a weekly batch of accepted skins.

4. **The Item Store:** Every Thursday, a brand-new batch of skins is launched on the main Rust Item Store for a repaired, low cost (generally ranging from £ 0.99 to £ 3.00).

When bought from the official shop, these items have a one-week trade and market restriction. After that week, they enter the Steam Community Market, where supply and demand determine their true value.

The Rust Skin Economy: Supply and Demand

The Rust skin market operates similar to a real-world stock exchange. Rates change based on rarity, energy, and total player demand.

Aspects That Influence Skin Prices:

- **Supply Limits:** Skins only available for purchase throughout their preliminary weekly release often value in value gradually as active players grow.
- **Twitch Drops:** Promotional skins connected to specific streamers can often flood the market, reducing their worth, while older, unobtainable drops can escalate.

Popular Skin Categories and Tactical Advantages

1. Camouflage Skins
