### Goldfish Tank Size Calculator: The Golden Rules

#### 1. Single-Tail Goldfish (Common, Comet, Shubunkin)

- **Minimum Tank Size for One:** 75 gallons
- **Add per additional fish:** 50 gallons

2. Fancy Goldfish (Oranda, Fantail, Ryukin, Ranchu, Black Moor)

Fancy goldfish have egg-shaped bodies, double tails, and typically cranial growths (wen) or delicate eyes. While they are slower swimmers and do not reach the huge lengths of single-tails, they are still heavy waste producers.

- **Minimum Tank Size for One:** 20 to 30 gallons
- **Add per additional fish:** 10 to 20 gallons

# Factors Beyond Volume: Tank Shape Matters
