Costs change based upon supply, need, and market trends on the Steam Community Market (SCM).

How Case Opening Works

- 1. Acquire a Case and a Key**-- Cases can be made through gameplay (dropped after matches) or bought from the SCM. Keys are purchased from the in-game shop or from third-party marketplaces.
- 2. Open the Inventory Menu**-- Navigate to the "Cases" tab in the inventory screen.
- 3. Select a Case and a Key**-- Click the case you wish to open, then insert a coordinating key.
- 4. Confirm the Action**-- The video game displays a short animation that exposes a random item.
- 5. Get the Item**-- The skin is contributed to your inventory and can be kept, utilized, or offered.

Understanding Drop Odds

Each case follows a predefined likelihood distribution. While precise percentages can differ, the typical breakdown for a basic case appears like this:

Rarity Tier	Approximate Drop Chance
Mil-Spec (Blue)	~ 80%
Restricted (Purple)	~ 15%
Classified (Pink)	~ 4%
Covert (Red)	~ 0.8%
Rare Special Item (Gold)	~ 0.2%

These numbers are averages; some unusual cases (e.g., the eSports 2014 Summer Case) have actually modified chances to increase the chance of knives.

Do's and Do n'ts

- **Do** set a stringent budget plan before opening cases. Decide in advance just how much you're prepared to invest and never surpass it.
- **Do** keep the skins you like for individual usage instead of focusing solely on resale.
- **Do** screen market patterns; particular skins increase in worth throughout tournaments or after new case releases.
- **Don't** chase losses by buying more keys in hopes of "winning back" money.
- **Don't** deal with case opening as an investment method; the chances are not in your favour.

Tips for Maximising Value

- **Buy cases when they're inexpensive**-- Newer cases tend to be inexpensive at launch, then rise as the supply shrinks.
- **Usage trade-up contracts**-- By combining lower-tier skins, you can possibly obtain a higher-tier skin at a reduced cost.
- **Offer instantly after opening**-- If you're not planning to use the skin, noting it on the SCM right away can lock in existing market rates before they dip.

Where to Buy, Sell, and Trade

- **Steam Community Market**-- The official platform for purchasing and offering skins. It provides safe and secure transactions however imposes a 15% charge on earnings.
- **Third-Party Marketplaces**-- Sites like Buff.163, Skinport, or DMarket frequently supply lower costs and faster liquidity, however validate the platform's credibility to avoid rip-offs.
- **Trade-Up Sites**-- Some neighborhoods host "trade-up" services where you can exchange several products for an opportunity at a rarer skin, typically for a service charge.

1. Just how much does it cost to open a CS2 case?
