An office, storefront, or service counter may have multiple employees, temporary access, and locks that need to stay organized across several entry points. A business owner who needs tighter control may call a [commercial locksmith](#) after turnover, schedule changes, or a lost key report, because access control becomes harder to track the more people are involved.

That is where a locksmith's judgment matters more than a generic service menu. If the goal is to reduce access without changing the whole hardware set, rekeying is efficient and tidy.
