- **Pro Player Popularity:** If a prominent esports professional utilizes a specific skin during a Major tournament, need for that skin generally increases over night.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell 10 skins of the same rarity for one skin of the next greater tier, creating a stable need for lower-tier items.
