

Laurel sits in that useful middle ground that travelers often appreciate only after they have spent a day or two here. It is close enough to Washington, Baltimore, and Annapolis to make regional outings easy, yet it has its own rhythm, shaped by neighborhood parks, long-standing community institutions, and a compact downtown that still feels walkable in places.
