The Anatomy of a CS2 Skin

1. Wear Ratings (Float Value)

Every skin is designated a float worth ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical wear and tear. Rather than deteriorating through usage, a skin's float is long-term upon production.

Condition Float Range Visual Description **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Pristine, minimal to no scratches.

Minimal Wear (MW) 0.07-- 0.15 Minor blemishes or small scratches. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Visible wear, scratches, and fading. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.44 Substantial wear; paint is visibly cracked. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.44-- 1.00 Greatly worn, rusted, or hardly recognizable.

Note: Some skins are "capped," meaning they can not exist in specific conditions (e.g., a skin might only spawn approximately Minimal Wear).

2. StatTrak™ Technology

Skins with the StatTrak™ prefix function a small, radiant LED counter connected to the weapon body. This counter tracks the precise variety of kills the owner has actually secured with that specific weapon. When equipped by another gamer, it temporarily shows an "mistake" till returned to the owner. StatTrak skins usually command a greater cost on the marketplace.

3. Souvenir Packages

Throughout Valve-sponsored Major tournaments, viewers viewing through Steam or partnered streaming platforms can drop Souvenir Packages. Weapons inside these bundles feature gold sticker labels celebrating the match, the groups, and the MVP of the round, making them extremely collectible.

Rarity Tiers and Drop Rates

Skins are classified into distinct rarity tiers, which determine how often they appear in weapon cases. The rarity color codes are universally recognized in the gaming neighborhood:

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental weapon surfaces.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly exceptional to consumer grade.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard low-tier items discovered in cases.
- **Limited (Purple):** Mid-tier items; frequently used in trade-ups.
- **Categorized (Pink):** Highly desired, striking styles.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest basic weapon tier; incredibly uncommon.
- **Unusual Special Item (Gold):** Knives and Gloves. The holy grail of unboxing.

- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade ten skins of one rarity tier for a single skin of the next higher tier, providing a method to recycle unwanted products.
