Spring: the cleanup that sets the tone

Early spring is when yards show the truth. If beds are under-mulched, you see it. If drainage is off, you notice it when puddles hold longer than expected. If lawn edges were not maintained or were installed poorly, you can sometimes spot sinking or gaps early.

Spring maintenance often includes debris cleanup, mowing as growth resumes, and inspecting shrubs and trees for winter damage. This is also a time when soil condition can limit what you can do. Walking on muddy lawns compacts soil and can lead to ruts. A top service adjusts schedules based on conditions instead of forcing work when the ground is too soft.

Summer: consistent care before problems expand

In summer, the biggest challenge is maintaining appearance without overcorrecting. The temptation is to chase every spot, but lawns and beds respond best to consistent, measured care.

For beds, summer is when mulch settles and weeds take advantage of thin spots. That is also when you can see whether your planting layout makes sense. I have seen properties where the landscaping looked great in June, then started unraveling by late August. Often the issue is not the plants themselves, it is the schedule. If mulch refreshes and bed maintenance are rushed or skipped, weeds and bare soil expand faster than people expect.

Fall: protecting the lawn and preparing beds

Fall is where lawns can either rebound or decline. Leaf drop can cover turf and reduce oxygen exchange. If the lawn stays damp under a thick layer of leaves, bare patches can form and stay visible next spring.

A strong service typically accounts for late-season mowing and debris management, and it plans for winter readiness. For many yards, it also makes sense to refresh mulch beds and address any edging issues while the ground is still workable.

Winter: planning for the next spring

Winter maintenance looks different, but it matters. Snow and ice can shift edging, expose roots, and bring down branches that were already stressed. A quality service documents what it sees during winter storms so you do not discover problems in March when you are trying to restart everything at once.
