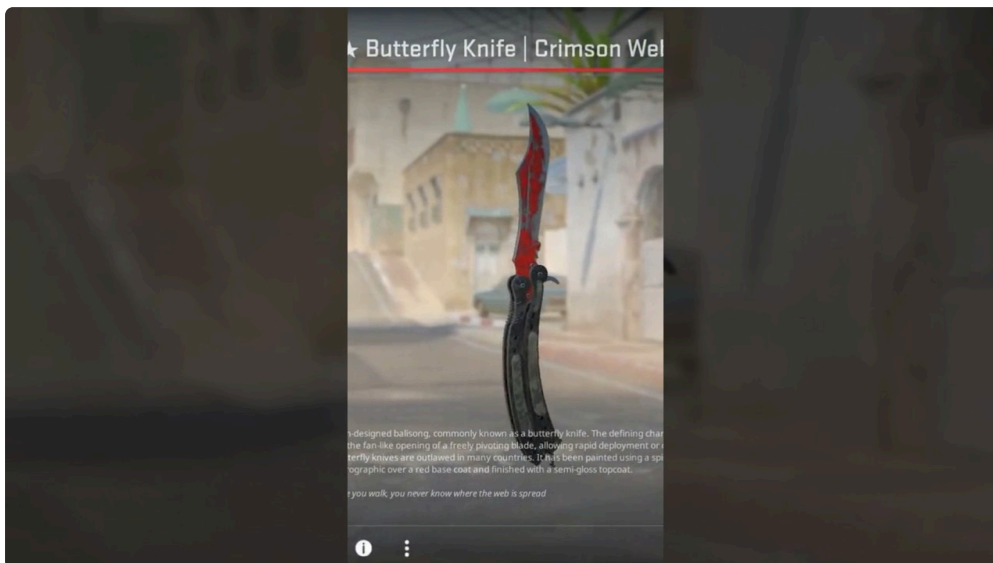

Age Restrictions

The majority of jurisdictions require users to be a minimum of 18 years old (or 21 in the United States) to get involved in real-money gambling. Reputable case websites implement this by asking for ID verification during the deposit procedure.



Licensing and Regulation

Case sites run in a grey location of online betting law.
