4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Significant paint chipping and heavy wear patterns.

- 5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily degraded, in some cases looking rusted, weathered, or almost entirely removed of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the well-known AWP|Asiimov-- do not spawn in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states incredibly rare and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital possessions runs likewise to a real-world stock market. Costs are dictated purely by supply and demand, influenced by several key factors:



- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports professional starts utilizing a particular skin during a major tournament, the need for that item generally surges over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping certain older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins included within them-- dwindles, triggering costs to rise organically with time.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in 10 weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, burning products out of flow and completely changing supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations introduce new thematic collections, briefly flooding or shifting the focus of the market.
