

If a horse has a hollow outline, a underdeveloped hindquarters, or a lean shape along the spine, the answer is not usually just “more horse feed.” Topline condition depends on a blend of muscle development, calorie intake, amino acid quality, forage intake, and overall harmony in the ration.
