- **Risk Level:** Low per round, but susceptible to unexpected 1.00 x crashes ("instant busts") that erase built up earnings in a single round.

3. The Reverse Martingale (Paroli)

- **How it works:** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, riding hot streaks while keeping losses minimal throughout cold streaks.
- **Risk Level:** Moderate. Needs discipline to walk away after a few consecutive wins.
